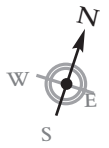


To Chapel Amble village, Maltsters Arms and Post Office just 2 minutes walk away.

Nesting mute swans hatched eight signets in 2005 and have now taken them up the River Camel to a new home at Wadebridge.

Damp woodland of Oak, Ash, Larch, Holly and Hawthorn. Elder bushes are coming into flower. Listen for willow warbler, chiff-chaff and wood pigeon in the early evening. This is a favourite spot for badgers and foxes to roam.

This small stream flows into the River Amble and then onto the River Camel - it is a favourite haunt for otters and wild mink.

This field, re-seeded last year is being cut for silage, it grew corn for the previous 15

Silage is grass cut and stored in fresh clamps or big round bails. The grass is compressed to expel air then ferments. The products of fermentation preserve the grass, turning it into a palatable animal fodder and an alternative to hay.
